

Rates 'too complex'

GOVERNMENT plans to simplify energy tariffs are still too complex to allow consumers to find the cheapest deal, according to a

watchdog.
Which? said a survey found just three in 10 people chose correctly when asked to identify the cheapest deal using Ofgem's Tariff Comparison Rate proposal.

The consumer group is

recommending tariffs are presented in the style of a petrol forecourt display using single unit prices, claiming 84% picked the cheapest deal using this format.

Two-thirds of people said they preferred the single unit price model.

A 92-YEAR-OLD who carried out 60 wartime bombing raids is helping young soldiers get back on civvy

John Hall, who flew missions over Nazi-occupied Europe in the Second World War, was presented with the Distinguished Flying Cross for valour

But, like thousands of other ex-service personnel since, another battle began after leaving the forces.

He overcame depression and

drink to control his horrific memories.

Now the pensioner, from Sunderland, Tyne and Wear, is mentoring other soldiers to help them face their own demons.

"Most people come out saying they were happy in the army," said John. "But they've forgotten what civilian life is like and they need to learn it all over again.

As a flight lieutenant, he witnessed the horrors of battle He joined some of the first and most dangerous raids in

the RAF's famous Lancaster bombers. Many missions were under Wing Commander Guy Gibson, the man hailed a hero for leading the Dambusters.
"One of the hairiest raids was

on Nuremberg," said John. "We sent 800 aircraft out — 96 didn't come back.

"You could see aircraft going down in flames and the flashing of guns. It was hell on earth." His Lancaster was also shot

leaving John and his crew floating towards the Atlantic for four days.

They were only saved when a naval crew launched a rescue

operation.
"Another half hour and we'd have been out into the Atlantic — they'd never have found us,' said John, a father-of-one.

But back home, the war was

taking its toll.
Wife Gladys and the couple's young daughter Sheila had been sent a telegram declaring John "missing in action" when his bomber ditched.

John said: "Gladys had been

out shopping and the woman next door had taken the telegram and just said 'your husband's gone'.

"My wife dropped all her

groceries and collapsed.
"She had a nervous breakdown and it took us five years to get the better of it."
After the war he returned

home and went back to his old job in a paper mill in Hemel Hempstead before returning to his native north east.
